PEACE THOUGHTS

Mary of Nazareth knew well what it meant to be strong. She was strong enough to know that she had been favoured by God when the society of her time said she couldn't be so favoured, and tradition said she wouldn't be. She was strong enough never to give up, not to be afraid to begin over, again and again - after Bethlehem, after Egypt, and after the crucifixion. Mary is not simply 'Mary, the Mother of God', on the contrary, the Mother of God is the image of women everywhere. The Mother of God is Mary, the independent woman; Mary, the unmarried mother; Mary, the homeless woman; Mary, the political refugee; Mary, the Third World woman; Mary, the mother of the condemned; Mary, the widow who outlives her child; Mary, the woman of our time who shares the divine plan of salvation; Mary, the bearer of Christ.

Mary shows us the sanctifying power of a human being who has become fully human. Alongside Miriam and Judith and Deborah - heroines of the Jewish tradition - today our Mary takes her place in an established lineage of rebel women who exercised their own power in order to accomplish the will of God. She has made feminism an article of the faith, and her power is holy. So, let's go forth today with eyes fixed on the world through the lens of Mary's great prayer, the Magnificat, where the lowly are lifted high and participate, as she did, in God's reordering of the world.

Mary of Nazareth, be our example. Guide us as we also strive to do God's will in our own time and place. Amen.


