









This week's mathematician has been trying hard and not giving up when things get difficult. He should be so proud of himself and we are proud of him too. Well done!

Regular attendance at school is the single most important factor in a child/children making appropriate progress and achieving success. Good, regular and punctual attendance means doing well academically, developing better relationships with other children and positive behaviour. It also sets up good habits for when young people enter into work and life.



We aim for average school attendance to be 97% There are 190 days in a school year which leaves 175 days to spend on family time, shopping, appointments and other things.

It is also important to arrive at school on time. If a child arrives late to school every day, their learning begins to suffer. This graph shows how being late to school every day over a school year adds up to lost learning time.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

In the interest of your child's safety and well being, a named adult needs to be contactable at all times. Please ensure the school has at least 3 up to date telephone numbers. If school are unable to contact you and have concerns we may call the police and request a welfare check.

Can you please call school at the beginning of the day if your child is going to be absent.

Temper tantrums usually start around 18 months and are very common in toddlers. One reason for this is toddlers want to express themselves but find it difficult. They feel frustrated and the frustration comes out as a

Once a child can talk they're less likely to have tantrums so by the age of 4 they are less common.

The following ideas may help you cope with tantrums when they happen.

Find out why the tantrum is happening

- Is the child tired or hungry Are they frustrated by something
- Are they jealous of another child

If you sense a tantrum starting find a distraction.

- Find something to distract them with straight away
- Point to something interesting
- Engage them in a activity

Wait for it to stop

Once your child is mid- tantrum don't threaten them, lecture or argue with them- this will only make it worse. Losing your temper or shouting back wont end them tantrum. Ignore any looks you may get from people around you and focus on staying calm.

Don't change your mind

If you've said "NO" to something don't change your mind and say yes to end the tantrum. Giving in wont help in the long term. Your child will start to think that tantrums 2can get them what they want. For the same reason, its doesn't help to bribe them with sweets or treats. If your at home, as long as your child is safe, leave them and go into another room.

Be prepared in shops

Tantrums often happen in shops. This can be embarrassing and make it harder for you to stay calm. Keep shopping trips as short as possible. Involve your child in shopping by talking about what need and letting them help you

Talk to them


Children often go through phases of being upset or insecure and express their feelings through tantrums or aggressive behaviour. Finding out what is worrying them is the first step of being able to help.

Show them you love them but not their behaviour

Show them you love them by praising good behaviour and giving them plenty of cuddles when they're not behaving badly.

Help them let their feelings out another way

Finding a big space, such as the park and encourage your child to run and shout. Letting your child know that you understand their feelings will make it easier for them to express themselves.


