Dear Parents and Carers,

What a wintery week it has been! Whilst we have had lots of beautiful winter sunny days to enjoy it has been difficult managing the snow and ice on foot and with transport. Thank you for your patience and support on Tuesday with our later start to the school day. This helped to give time for staff to get to school safely and for us to clear footpaths around the school grounds. We kicked off the year with Superbat, focusing on our comprehension skills, blending, ambitious vocabulary and also finding our passion for reading. Our writing has focused on our new book Juniper Jupiter and children are showing huge progress in not only letter formation but also in using Wise Owl's good writing techniques, we look forward to continuing our independent writing using lots of beautiful vocabulary and using our story friends to help sequence our story. Superheroes have driven a mighty force into our continuous provision and enjoying dressing up in our superheroes costumes, using new vocabulary to role play different heroes. We have been taking advantage of our dry crisp weather to spend more time outside, we have particularly enjoyed 'laser obstacles' focusing on children's gross motor skills, spacial awareness and reasoning as well as using lots of mathematic language to negotiate space. In math, we are continuing our deep dive into number with a particular focus starting the year with exploring how numbers get bigger when we add more. Shining Stars is a class which focus on our Catholic values of kindness and being part of a community and we are so proud of what a caring, joyful class family we are.



This phonics superstar has made so much progress since the start of the year. He's doing so well at learning his sounds that he'll be reading big books on his own in no time!





Regular attendance at school is the single most important factor in a child/children making appropriate progress and achieving success. Good, regular and punctual attendance means doing well academically, developing better relationships with other children and positive behaviour. It also sets up good habits for when young people enter into work and life.



We aim for average school attendance to be 97% There are 190 days in a school year which leaves 175 days to spend on family time, shopping, appointments and other things.

It is also important to arrive at school on time. If a child arrives late to school every day, their learning begins to suffer. This graph shows how being late to school every day over a school year adds up to lost learning time.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

In the interest of your child's safety and well being, a named adult needs to be contactable at all times. Please ensure the school has at least 3 up to date telephone numbers. If school are unable to contact you and have concerns we may call the police and request a welfare check.

Can you please call school at the beginning of the day if your child is going to be absent.



Measles symptoms include: high fever; sore, red, watery eyes; coughing; aching and feeling generally unwell; a blotchy red brown rash, which usually appears after the initial symptoms. catching measles has risen. It's never too late to be vaccinated You need two doses of MMR one month apart to be fully protected against measles, mumps and rubella.

It's time to make measles a disease of the past.

If you have symptoms of measles, stay at home and phone your GP or NHS 111 for advice. STAY AWAY from GP surgeries and A&E departments – you could spread the illness to others.

When your child starts nursery they will be learning and playing with more children. If they are not up to date with their jabs, they could be at risk of catching preventable diseases.




