As a catholic school the foundation of all we do is based upon Christ and his gospel values. The values that we embrace underpin every aspect of school life.

‘Moral and Spiritual education helps pupils to acquire insights into their personal existence which are of enduring worth. It is characterised by reflection, the attribution of meaning to experience, valuing a non-material dimension to life and intimations of an enduring reality.’

At St. Michael's we seek to enhance our pupils' moral and spiritual education and to encourage our children to develop attitudes of praise and reverence. We allow their natural instincts for awe and wonder to be realised and developed. We strive to proclaim the Christian message and live it alongside our children, their families, our school and parish community.

Moral and Spiritual education is fundamental to the development of the individual and concerned with developing a child's ability to distinguish right from wrong, to make appropriate choices and to act upon them from conviction.

Personal morality combines the beliefs and value of the individual, those of the social, cultural and religious groups to which he/she belongs and the laws and customs of the wider society.

Aims of Spiritual Education

- To become aware of and reflect on experience.
- To question and explore the meaning of experience.
- For children to demonstrate knowledge of other world religions and philosophies.
- For children to show an understanding of how people have sought to explain the universe.
- To develop personal views and insights.

Aims of Moral Education

- Understanding the difference between right and wrong and the importance of striving to do right. This understanding will:
- Inform pupils' thinking and actions and help them make the right choices.
- Prompt the constant attempt to become a better person,
- Increase fellow feeling and the willingness to make an effort to understand others;
- Build pupils' respect for themselves, others, their society and their environment;
- Enable pupils to engage in effective moral reasoning
- Help pupils understand the nature of being human and how to learn from their mistakes.
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Teaching and Learning of Moral and Spiritual Education

Spiritual education is not a separate subject to be taught as part of the National Curriculum, but encompasses most subject areas such as R.E., R.S.H.E., English as well as Prayer and Liturgy and everyday life.

We provide the opportunity for the development of Spirituality in a range of ways:

- The distinctive Catholic ethos
- RE lessons, reflecting on the tradition of the Church and scripture and how faith is learnt, experienced and lived.
- Celebration of the Word
- My Happy Minds
- PSHE
- Opportunities for personal reflection
- Hearing His word spoken in Scripture
- Celebration of Mass
- The Explore curriculum that creates a sense of awe and wonder, especially in RE
- Encouraging pupils to relate their learning to a wider frame of reference- asking 'why', 'how' and 'where' as well as 'what'.
- Opportunities to express personal views and insights
- Use of the outdoor area
- Organised trips and days with the specific focus on spirituality

Evaluation Criteria

The extent to which the following opportunities are provided:

- To acquire insights into their personal existence
- To make sense of their life experience
- To develop a sense of wonder, awe, reverence, imagination
- To develop the human capacity to go beyond physical, tangible reality
- To develop a sense of the presence of God in their lives
- To reflect on and respond to this presence
- To become familiar with the life, words and action of Jesus
- To become familiar with the life, words and actions of the saints and significant Christians
- To hear of how people of other faiths respond to the spiritual dimension of life

Resources

A range of materials in line with National Curriculum recommendation will be used. The purchase of new material will be undertaken after consultation with staff and the headteacher as and when required.

Staff Professional Development

Staff are encouraged to develop their own skills and knowledge to enhance their teaching of spiritual education which is supported by the school's prayer and liturgy and whole staff RE days.
